This checklist will be most useful to those who understand the critical relationship between particular birds and suitable habitat. Additionally, a number of breeding and migratory species have extremely limited ranges. The 5,351 foot difference between the area's highest and lowest points offers birds and birders a variety of unique ecosystems. The order of families and individual species included in this checklist, as well as months within each season, conforms to the standards of the American Ornithological Union and its Checklist of North American Birds.

Sightings of unlisted species and those designated as R (rare) warrant documentation. Observers are encouraged to send their reports with complete details to: New Mexico Bird Records Committee, 1819 Meadowview Dr. NW, Albuquerque, NM 87104. Accompanying audio, video, and photograph evidence is most desirable, but not returnable. Two sources for current information about Colfax County and statewide bird sightings are: (1) the New Mexico Rare Bird Alert (NMRBA) at 505-884-3269, and (2) www.birder.com (select Birding, then select Rare Bird Alert, then scroll down to New Mexico on the menu).
